Museum Working Party

1919 PEACE MEDAL by Helen Marsonet

The 1919 Peace Medal (also known as the Victory Medal) was issued to every child in Australia aged 0 - 14 years and aged up to 16 years if parents were in the armed forces.

The medal commemorates the signing of the Treaty of Versailles in June 1919 that formally ended WW1. It was designed by Charles Douglas Richardson who was well known for his sculptures. 1,670.000 medals were manufactured. The medals were silvered bronze, with silver issues for special presentations. The Defence Department supplied a red, white and blue striped ribbon and pin. Distribution began in 1919.

It is my belief that RDHS Cottage Museum has a piece of the ribbon used to hold the medal. I found it together with an army hat Rising Sun Emblem and other WW1 ephemera many years ago. I wonder if we had a medal at some time in the past? I found out about the existence of these medals through an issue of Randwick and District Historical Society's newsletter which a member forwards to the Society for reference and interest purposes.

The front of the medal features a laurel wreath above which is the King's crown with the word 'Victory' over the rays of the sun. A sailor and a digger stand at ease on either side of the wreath within which is cast 'The Triumph Of Liberty And Justice' Below the wreath is a small panel with the words 'The Peace Of 1919'.

The reverse features a symbolic figure of PEACE holding a sword and standing on a plinth marked 'Peace 1919'. Behind her fly two doves and at her feet two figures are freed from their shackles.

As we are commemorating WW1 this year, I am wondering if someone has one of these medals. As so many were manufactured, it is likely that there are some lying around in boxes or drawers and are perhaps, unknown to the owners as to what they represent. The picture below is from the internet but if anyone has one of these medals, the Society would like to photograph it and add information about the original recipient to its archives.
